Employment

Employment opportunities kept presenting themselves in Term 4 just like they had throughout 2022. One of the most interesting worksite visits for the year took place at the old Woodlawn mine site in Tarago NSW run by Veolia. A former zinc and copper mine, The Woodlawn Eco Precinct is Veolia's 6,000ha site located approximately 50km north of Canberra and comprises several facilities including a Bioreactor landfill, BioEnergy plant, the Aquaculture (Barramundi) and horticulture (Beef, Sheep and Crop) farm, a Wind Farm and a Solar Farm. On this visit the boys got a look at all of the careers available at



the site, including helping staff send a load of barramundi off to market from their fish farm.

Sport

Our Regional Cricket Carnival was held in Week 3 this term at Wagga Indoor Sports Centre. It was a fun filled day with Academies from Griffith, Tumut, Narrandera, Kooringal, Orange and Narrandera all participating and giving their best.
