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Message from the Director

This year marks a milestone for the Tumut Academy as it has been five years since we started in 2019. In typical Clontarf fashion, the year has flown by with our calendar filled with many valuable experiences as we work alongside the boys, supporting them in their school journey. As we reflect on the year that has been, we would like to highlight some of the achievements of our Academy in 2023.

- Community involvement: We have participated in numerous events this year, supporting and giving back to the community. Some of these events include Anzac Day, Brungle Public School's Stem Expo, NAIDOC events, Elder's Morning Tea, Yarning Circle Openings, Mother's Day Coffee Run, International Women's Day, Cultural Day at Snowy Valleys School, and Clean Up Australia Day. Additionally, we have supported our feeder primary schools, with our boys demonstrating leadership and initiative by running activities for the younger generation.
- Morning training: This is an important part of our program, helping to improve the boys' sleeping patterns while building their confidence and well-being. We trained for a total of over 60 mornings this year, with the boys up and ready for the bus from 6.00 am on Tuesdays and Fridays.
- Employment: We are gaining momentum in this area, with 11 boys in our program now employed part-time. Many other boys are seeking support in building their resumes and navigating the job application process.

- Licensing: We are proud to announce that two boys have obtained their Provisional Licences and five boys from Years 10-11 have obtained their Learners Licences. Many boys are gaining driving experience with the help of professional lessons from Phil Hayes from B Safe Driver School each term.
- Camps: We had a total of 12 camps throughout 2023. The purpose of these camps is to build important life skills, boost confidence, and foster relationships among the boys. We had some amazing camps this year, including the Year 7 Induction Camp in Talbingo, the Year 9 and 10 Camp to Canberra and the War Memorial, two top trainers trips to Sydney for the NRL and AFL, two trips to Jamberoo Waterpark, Ross Kelly Cup Sydney, and our Year 11 Major Trip to Sydney.
- Home and away series: This has been a major highlight for the Kooringal, Mount Austin, and James Fallon Academies. Each term, we have a day of sports competitions against each other, fostering friendships and creating lasting memories with boys from other areas.

We would like to thank everyone who has supported or contributed to our program in 2023. We hope you all have a safe and happy Christmas break and look forward to seeing you all again in 2024!

The night was kicked off with a Welcome to Country from Uncle Pat Connolly, who later in the evening. He was so happy and proud that the winner of that award was his young nephew, Jonny Minogue.

Jonny was one of eight academy members who graced the stage to deliver a recipient speech once he received his major award. Something that impressed a number of spectators, including a large number of Tumut High teachers that were in attendance.

"It was wonderful to see the boys be so grateful and speak so well on the

Year 11 Head to Big Smoke

With no Year 12 Academy Members this year, the Year 11 boys from the Tumut Clontarf Academy received a special camp at the completion of their Year 11 studies. The five boys and Clontarf staff headed off to Sydney for several days of adventure, which included various activities. The two most memorable experiences were the Jet Boat ride on Sydney Harbour and climbing the Sydney Harbour Bridge the following day.

The Jet Boat ride was an adrenaline rush, with the high-powered boat zooming across the harbour at top speeds that made the boys envious of what could be done in fishing boats on Blowering. "I didn't think for a minute that it was going to be that fast," said Isaac Castles. "And we got absolutely drenched! You wouldn't want to do it on a cold day. The boat driver was absolutely crazy, throwing us into spins and getting water everywhere. It was so much fun," he added.

But it was the activities of the following day that really got Isaac's blood pumping. "I was terrified about climbing the bridge. I don't think I slept more than ten minutes the night before. But Chicka reassured me that he hates heights and has done it before," said Castles. "Once I got up there, it was absolutely breathtaking! Except it was a little windy, so that kept everyone on their toes, including Chappy and Chicka."

The bridge climb has been used in the past as a way to celebrate the completion of high school for the boys. However, planning and discussions are already underway for the major trip for the Year 12 students in 2024. It will be a special year as it is the first group of students to have joined the program in Year 7. "We are really looking forward to seeing these lads finish. They were tiny when Chappy and I first started," said Chicka Douglas, the Operations Officer of the Academy. "Hopefully, the remaining five boys will support each other and motivate themselves to get the job done," he added.

The boys will have a camp in Term 1, which will involve planning the trip and signing a pledge as a group to commit to reaching the finish line. Good luck, boys! We are all here to help you!

A few boys were unable to attend due to work commitments, and two no longer live in town. Despite this, the small group spent two hours reconnecting and discussing their lives. Staff members also shared stories about how the academy operates since they left school. We are pleased to report that all the boys are currently employed in various positions, including Snowy Hydro, AKD, ARMY, Woolworths, DME, Dominos Pizza, and The Royal Hotel Kitchen, just to name a few.

In 2022, Adam Beaver, an alumnus, shared the exciting news of being accepted for an apprenticeship with DME Engineering. The delicious meals were prepared by Thomas Hibbens, a 2021 alumnus and recently qualified chef at the Royal Hotel in Tumut.

Regional Employment Officer Mitch Fennessy was also present to address any questions the boys had about additional training or support they may need for their employment and study journeys. "We will try to catch up with the lads twice a year to check on their progress and provide mentoring to the current students, emphasizing the importance of completing Year 12," Fennessy added.
